Leaguetown is located in West Texas. Leaguetown High School is a 5A school with a student population of 2,010.

School usually begins at 8:30 a.m., but on a late-start day, the regular school day begins at 10 a.m. For the past three years, Wednesdays have been late-start days. Principal Larry Youngstown has proposed dropping the late-start days, going back to the regular schedule and having all school days begin at 8:30 a.m.

IN FAVOR OF eliminating late-start days

Tardies increase on late-start days. Students who receive three tardies must serve detention. In addition, it is safer to have all students at school at the same time. Students who are unable to drive themselves to school or find an alternative ride must take the bus and wait for school to start. The majority of these students have no choice.

• **OPPOSED TO** eliminating late-start days

Late-start days give students time for tutoring, making up exams and studying. Those who don't need the extra time for school work have time to catch up on sleep.

"We started late-start days to give students extra time for tutoring of catching up when they are absent. Those days have become nothing more than a chance to sleep late. Too few students are using the extra time for school. If the late starts aren't used for their purpose, there is no need to have them.

"I'm not going to force us back to the old schedule. We are surveying parents and students. We will compile that information before deciding what the best course is for our students."

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
