# What is the purpose of your Editorial?



- Are you arguing a principle?
- Are you advocating a new position?
- Are you protesting a decision?
- Are you opposing a plan or proposal?
- Are you trying to change public opinion?
- Bottom line: what are you trying to get done?





### Typical Feature Situation

The prompt deals with a senior, Jason White, who almost lost his life while backpacking in a national forest in Wyoming over spring break. He was alone and lost, and he tripped and twisted his right ankle trying to leap a stream. His cell phone ran out of power. To make matters worse, a winter storm rolled through, sending the temperatures plummeting. Jason thought he was going to freeze or be killed by wild animals.



## **Basics of Headline Writing**

Keep it simple: noun, verb, object. In a basic news story, ask: who did what? Write your headline from that. For example:

#### Write a 1-line headline counting 26-32

The school district is considering pushing back the starting time for its high school in response to research about adolescents' need for more sleep. The school board will hear a proposal Monday to start high school classes next fall at 8:30 a.m. rather than 7:25 a.m. If the proposal is approved, fall classes would end at 3:10 p.m. instead of 2:05 p.m.



#### Answer all news questions

Who:

The School Board

What:

Discussed the off-campus lunch policy, then voted to discontinue the policy of allowing students to leave the campus for lunch. Lunch is noon to 12:45 p.m.

When:

7:30 p.m. Tuesday

Where:

Quote sources accurately and fully.

Why:

Because of reports of students leaving campus during lunch to use alcohol, tobacco and/or drugs.

Impact:

The decision will go into effect the first day of class next fall.
