

### rivière <ree.VYEHR>

n / single-stranded necklace of precious stones While looking at the necklaces in the jewelry store, I saw a beautiful single-stranded sapphire ---.

Note: Grave accent regd on 1st 'e'

### mauve <MOHV>

n / color varying between purple and lilac
The woman's entire wardrobe was done in ---, from her violet

pelagic <puh.LAJ.ik>

adj / relating to the open sea

dress to her plumed purple hat.

With no means of locomotion, the Portuguese man-of-war is a floating --- organism causing painful stings.

### rectrix <REK.triks>

n / one of the stiff tail feathers of a bird that controls flight direction

We found a long, striped feather, and knew it had been a --from a cuckoo by its pattern.

pulque <POOL.kay> or <POOL.kee> <PUL.kay> <PUL.kee>

n / fermented drink made in Mexico

Alicia tasted the --- made from fermented maguey sold in the Mexican marketplace.

atemoya <ah.tuh.MAWI.uh> or <at.uh.MAWI.uh>

n / green fruit with sweet, white flesh; tree producing such fruit

Lucinda's favorite exotic fruit is the heart-shaped --- .

### dragée <drah.ZHAY>

n / candy with medicine in the center

My French grandmother told of taking a --- with cod liver oil in it daily when she was a child.

Ety: Fr fr MFr fr L - tragematae (sweetmeats) fr Gk - trogein (eat fruit) Note: Acute accent read on 1st 'e'

### woomera, woomerah <WUM.uhr.uh>

n / hooked stick used by aborigines as a weapon Besides the unusual aboriginal art I bought in Australia, I also brought back this spear called a --- .

### oneiric <oh.NII.rik>

adj / suggesting dreams; dreamy

Arnim admitted that his --- story line had indeed come from one of his fantastic dreams.

Ety: Gk - oneiros (dream)

### menorah <muh.NAWR.uh>

n / branched candelabrum used in Jewish worship A 7-branched candelabrum called a --- is used in the Jewish worship service and represents 7 days of creation.

### golem <GOH.luhm>

n / blockhead, robot or Jewish figurine In Saul's eyes, Carter had no mind of his own, being just a --reciting propaganda as his own thoughts.

Ety: Yid fr Heb - golem (something shapeless)

vendue <VEN.doo> or <VEN.dyoo> <ven.DYOO> <ven.DOO>
 n / auction, public sale of items to the highest bidder
 The --- was arranged, and the auctioneer disposed of every
 item in the massive Victorian house in only 2 days.

### Miesian <MEE.see.uhn>

adj / relating to a German-born American architect or his work

The Seagram Building in New York has typical --- style with its steel and glass structural design.

Note: Always capitalized

### kalimba <kuh.LIM.buh>

n / African instrument made from a wooden box with bars to pluck to make tones

When Karen came back from her trip to Africa, she brought a --- to Sally who loved stringed instruments.

### Vouvray <voo.VRAY>

n / dry white wine from a particular area of France Mrs. Arnold preferred a white wine with a fruity taste to the dry --- they were served.

Ety: Fr geog name - Vouvray (village in Loire area of France where it is produced) Note: Always capitalized

### • Romaic <roh.MAY.ik>

adj, n / relating to modern Greek

Over time, Greece shifted from a pagan, Hellenic culture to a ---, or modern Greek, culture.

Ety: Gk fr L geog name - Roma/-ae (Rome) Note: Always capitalized

### asocial <ay.SOH.shuhl>

adj / withdrawn from association with others; not willing to conform to normalcy

The child's --- behavior worried his mom, and she consulted a psychologist to work with the withdrawn youth.

### tankard <TANG.kuhrd>

n / tall, one-handled mug made of silver or pewter *Mr. Carson poured the ale into a tall --- and reminisced about other mugs or beer in English pubs long ago.* 

### yoicks <YAWIKS>

interj / hunting cry used to prompt the dogs to chase the fox

One of the hunters spotted the fox and yelled, "---!" to rouse the dogs into pursuit.

Note: Also hoicks only <HAWIKS>

### quetzal <ket.SAHL>

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{n}}$  / Central American bird with bright feathers; kind of Guatemalan money

The resplendent bronze-green and red foliage of the --- was reserved for imperial use by the Aztecs.

### soupçon <soop.SAWN> or <SOOP.sahn>

n / trace, a small amount

A --- of envy crept into the actor's voice when he congratulated his cohort on getting the coveted part.

Note: Cedilla reqd on 'c'

### • prefatory <PREF.uh.tawr.ee>

adj / prior to or preparing for the main matter of business

Before we get down to the main business at hand, we would like to take care of any --- matters.

Ety: L - praefor/-ari (mention beforehand/say)

### pedantic <puh.DAN.tik>

adj / without practical knowledge due to narrow concerns for book learning; pedestrian
The scholarly young man always made the Dean's list, but his work often showed a narrow and --- outlook.

### synizesis <sin.i.ZEE.sis>

n / fusion of two syllables into one by uniting two adjacent vowels

The grammarian explained that the pronunciation of the double "e" in "eleemosynary" as one letter is ---.

### • piacular <pii.AK.yuh.luhr>

adj / making atonement for a transgression; wicked The primitive religion used --- sacrifices to appease the gods for any sins or sacrileges.

Ety: L - piaculum/-i (sacrificial rite) fr pio/-are (atone for/cleanse)

### • kyphosis <kii.FOH.sis>

n / abnormal backward curvature of the spine The orthopedist treated the patient for --- . Ety: Gk - kuphos (bent)

acetylene <uh.SET.uhl.een> or <uh.SET.uhl.uhn>
n / colorless hydrocarbon gas used as a fuel
The welder used --- and oxygen in his cutting torch to cut
through the heavy metal door.

### vallation <va.LAY.shuhn>

n / earthwork wall built for defense The troops moved in at night, quickly building a --- to protect themselves for the attack at dawn.

### ligneous <LIG.nee.uhs>

adj / woody, having a woody appearance Tropical forests have more --- than herbaceous plants because the many trees crowd the shrubby undergrowth. Ety: L-ligneus/-a/-um (wooden) fr lignum/-i (wood/timber)

### Salzburg <SAWLZ.burg> or <SAHLZ.burg> <ZAHLTZ.burk>

n / Austrian city that is near the border of Germany Originally a Celtic settlement, --- is now a prime music center and resort that attracts tourists.

Note: Always capitalized

### ravigote <ra.vee.GAWT>

n / French green sauce

Made with spinach, vinegar, and herbs, --- is a rich complement to many French dishes.

### • rufescent <roo.FES.uhnt>

adj / reddish, having a bronze or reddish color The art teacher pointed to the --- tones of the painting that gave the entire picture a reddish-bronze cast.

Ety: L - rufesco/-ere (become red) fr rufus/-a/-um (reddish)

### • underling <UHN.duhr.ling>

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{n}}$  / one who is of a lower rank or is subordinate to another

The CEO of the company asked the office manager to have an --- run errands for him every Wednesday afternoon.

Ety: ME fr OE

### judgmatic <juhj.MAT.ik>

adj / wise, discreet

The vice-principal handled problems in a --- manner, and all felt his discipline measures were even-handed.

### Eucharist <YOO.kuh.rist>

n / Holy Communion; ceremony in Christian churches where wine and bread are consumed

During the --- ceremony, the church congregation consumed bread and wine symbolic of the Lord's Supper.

Note: Always capitalized

### decedent <di.SEED.uhnt>

n / person who is dead

Reading my uncle's will, the attorney kept referring to Uncle Al as the ---, and it seemed so impersonal.

### • abidance <uh.BII.duhns>

n / continuance; compliance

After causing trouble at school, the principal said Jon's --- by the rules was required to avoid suspension.

Ety: ME fr OE - bidan (wait)

### Kathmandu, Katmandu <kat.man.DOO> or

<kaht.mahn.DOO>

n / capital city of Nepal

Founded circa 723, the --- city of Gurkha was the capital in 1768 and remained so until the late 18th century.

Note: Always capitalized

### timocracy <tii.MAHK.ruh.see>

n / political system which glorifies either wealth or love of honor

Plato's view of --- placed a premium on honor and glory, but Aristotle's view held wealth as more important.

Ety: MFr fr ML fr Gk - timokratia (polity based on honor/wealth) fr time (value/honor) + Gk - kratos (power)

### obliquely <oh.BLEEK.lee> or <uh.BLEEK.lee>

adv / in a devious, dishonest or misleading manner; indirectly or evasively

The politician --- answered the questions, and his manner served to deliberately mislead the voters.

### vexatious <vek.SAY.shuhs>

adj / disturbing, distressing

Johnny's mother thought the new puppy was only --- and problematical, but Johnny loved the little rascal.

### oxymoron <ahk.see.MAWR.ahn>

n / combination of words that have conflicting meanings

A phrase, such as "cruel kindness," is an --- with the two words having contradictory meanings.
