LINDA SONG, cosmetology teacher

"I was devastated when I heard this. We've worked hard to build our program, and I think it's an important program. Even if students don't want to be cosmetologists the rest of their lives, they learn a skill that can help pay for college or keep them going while they look for their perfect job. We need skilled cosmetologists even if they don't make a lot of money.

"Not only does this program teach them a marketable skill, it keeps some from dropping out. They can't afford beauty school. They have to scrape together the \$400 for the supplies for the program. We help them financially as much as we can because we know how important this is to them.

"I've joined other cosmetology teachers across the state who have called and written to the State Board of Education."

"I've been letting cosmetology students cut my hair since the program began. It's my way of showing support, and I've always been pleased with the results. It's also nice to see how proud these students are of their work, of knowing they can do something that will make someone else happy and feel good about themselves. I'll be disappointed if TEA eliminates the program."

GEORGE WILSON, counselor

"More than half of our students come from economically disadvantaged families. Programs like cosmetology give those students real-life experience so that they are employable when they graduate. I hope at least some of them go on to college, and when they do, they will have a skill that will pay for college expenses. I don't understand why TEA would want to take that away from students. Taking it away certainly wouldn't help them."
