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

Develop a character

A simple way to start is by identifying the <u>character</u> or characters. This answers the questions, "<u>Who</u> is this story going to be about?" For instance, if there is picture of a lion, the lion could be the character.

But what if there are no characters? What if all your pictures are just images of "things," like a pencil, a key, or a sunset? This could happen. So, don't forget that <u>even things can be characters</u>. Make the pencil talk! Why not? It's *your* story and remember that the goal is to be an entertaining storyteller.
