Leaguetown High School has a student population of 1,072 students and is located in Central Texas.

After the impact of COVID-19 pandemic restrictions and shutdowns on the student body, the Student Council is proposing a calendar of spirit weeks with one a month to improve student morale and re-engage students in school life and with each other. The LHS principal will make the decision which will be announced at the first pep rally on Friday afternoon. You are writing for Thursday's issue of the LHS newspaper.

FOR APPROVAL OF THE SPIRIT WEEK PROPOSAL

With sports and social activities limited for so long, the planned spirit weeks will not only re-engage students with school and each other, it will help them to recenter around LHS and all it has to offer. Each spirit week will be tied to a community service project which will help give purpose and meaning to the fun activities planned. The spirit weeks will also provide a way for students to release stress in a positive way while making a difference in the community.

AGAINST THE SPIRIT WEEK PROPOSAL

Gonzalez's best friend, Derek Smith, has even equipped his truck with special equipment to secure Gonzalez' wheelchair.

"Friends, real ones, are hard to come by in this life," Smith said. "There was a time when I reached rock bottom, and Sergio pulled me through it. I could do no less for him."
