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This work complements the alphabetic UIL word list for elementary and junior high students and is in the same alphabetic order to serves as a time-saving dictionary plus sentencea *Merriam-Webster's Intermediate Dictionary* for 3rd-and 4th grades and Merriam Webster's Online Dictionary for the 5th through 8th grades

Our unique pronunciation scheme is very similar to that now used by many major dictionaries and newspapers to provide a simple, "keyless" scheme for difficult words. Our scheme recognizes the following 14 primary vowel sounds; only a few should require your referencing our key at the bottom of each page.

Syllables are separated by periods. Those with primary emphasis are capitalized; those not emphasized are in lower case. Secondary emphasis is not indicated. Our simple system has been in use since 1983 by spellers, first in The National Spelling Bee, and a short time later by those in UIL competitions. This pronunciation scheme also forms the basis of our unique spelling software.

adj / tangible; perceptible; noticeable

 n / tumultuous uproar; evil place; living place of demons

paprika <puh.PREE.kuh>

parabola <puh.RAB.uh.luh>

n / curve shape related to or parallel to a section of a cone

n / likeness; state of being equal distance apart at all points on two lines

pathological <path.uh.LAHJ.i.kuhl>

adj / changed or caused by a diseased condition

adv / in a steadfast manner despite opposition or difficulty

Ed --- waited for Christmas, knowing that the day would ultimately come, but nothing could hurry it along.

patroon <puh.TROON>

n / one holding land in Dutch colony by a grant in exchange for bringing 50 settlers

pentathlon <pen.TATH.luhn> or <pen.TATH.lahn>

n / athletic contest with participation in five events During the Olympics, participants in the --- must ride a horse, swim, run, fence, and shoot.

n / hard, flavored candy; herb grown for its aromatic, pungent flavor
